Best practices for managing student behaviour

ducation's overarching purpose is to develop young people into well-rounded persons. Making ensuring the teaching and learning process runs as smoothly as feasible is frequently part of it. For the purpose of establishing and maintaining a calm learning environment in the classroom, classroom behaviour management is crucial. Also, it enhances academic learning, promotes social and emotional development, raises student participation in the classroom, and reduces disruptive behaviour.

A well-designed classroom, defined rules, a planned schedule, and a teaching method are typically included in an effective classroom behaviour control plan.

Let's discuss some behaviour management techniques that can be used to improve student conduct and enable teaching and learning to go as scheduled.

ular schedule is a crucial tool for managing behaviour since it helps set rules and expectations for behaviour. A routine

makes sure that pupils know what to expect next, which means you'll spend less time giving directions and more time working on the actual task at hand. Involve the students in creating a class timetable that works for everyone and assign them

some standard duties.

TO BEGIN, ESTABLISH CONNECTIONS: Welcome kids to your classroom at the beginning of each school year and participate with them in the opening activities of the day. Make it clear that you want to get to know them and are looking forward to

working with them. They might be more

courteous and responsible for their behaviour if they see that you care about them as individuals. Always act in the manner in which you would like your pupils to act, and if you are mistaken, be honest with your students about it. You might gain their respect by doing this.

LAUD EFFECTIVE CONDUCT: It is more beneficial to praise positive behaviour than to discipline or punish negative behaviour among students. When you want to encourage a behaviour, praise it. As an illustration, the phrase "Excellent work in

getting to your seats promptly" encourages settling down right away.

MAINTAIN A POSITIVE OUTLOOK: This leads us to our next piece of advice, which is to maintain a positive outlook in the classroom. This is a combination of modelling appropriate behaviour, making encouraging remarks as opposed to critical ones, and, addressing children with a smile and a kind word.


